Dear Chairman Lee and Ranking Member Heinrich:


I write to respectfully request your assistance in securing a legislative hearing for the *Carson City Public Land Correction Act* (S.3493). This proposal reflects years of collaboration with local stakeholders to ensure Carson City can grow responsibly by providing the city with additional land to construct housing and commercial buildings, improve infrastructure, and expand access to outdoor recreation opportunities. My bill would also ensure proceeds from land sales go towards local programs and conservation activities.

Since the enactment of the Omnibus Public Land Management Act (OPLMA) of 2009, Carson City has identified desired technical corrections that would benefit the public and provide for economic development. The *Carson City Public Land Correction Act* transfers nearly 1,300 acres of land for public purposes to Carson City to support flood mitigation, recreation, and water improvements, and improve transportation infrastructure and pedestrian safety. In addition, my bill makes 360 acres of land available for economic development opportunities in Carson City with revenues staying in the existing special account to support local wildfire prevention efforts, wilderness conservation, and protection of environmentally sensitive land.

The *Carson City Public Land Correction Act* supports the needs of Carson City's growing community and ensures local leaders are equipped with the necessary tools to keep our communities safe, support economic development, and bolster flood and wildfire prevention efforts.
